

6th Grade Reports and Projects

Historical Person Report Guidelines

Over the next six weeks your child will do a report on a person that we have already studied or will study this year in social studies. This is designed for students to be exposed to and encounter a person from the ancient world, or one of the people who have helped us to discover information about the ancient world.

Criteria:

You must have a title page including (in order): the historical person's name, the title of the report, student's name, teacher, date, and subject (social studies). The title page can be in any font size and type. Remember, it will be the first thing that people see when they look at your report.

The next item in the report will be a timeline. The timeline must include at least seven of the most important events in the person's life. Four of the seven events must be illustrated, of those four events, two events must be drawn by hand. The other two may come from other types of media. It should be done using two (or more) 8 1/2" x 11" pieces of paper attached horizontally. The timeline needs to be hand-drawn.

After the timeline will be at least one picture of the person, this may be taken from a book, the encyclopedia, the internet, as long as you have at least one picture of the person on which you are reporting.

After the timeline will be a map. This **MUST** be hand drawn and colored. You may trace it from another map, but we want to see that you are putting some effort into this project. The map that you draw will be where the person was born. Do this on one 8 1/2 x 11" piece of paper. Include major mountain ranges, any lakes, seas, river systems, and oceans surrounding the land. This is a geographical map showing the terrain of the area, not a political map, so you do not need to draw current boundaries of countries. Also, include the city in which he/she was born.

Below is a break down of how the report should be:

Paragraph One: Introduce the historical person

Paragraph Two: Talk about her/his early life

Paragraph Three: How did he/she leave their mark on the world? What accomplishments, achievements, inventions, or failures did they have or do? Why do we know about them?

Paragraph Four: End of life: death, what year? Where are they buried?

How did they die?

Paragraph Five: This is your personal response to what you have read. How did it make you feel? Do you like this person? Do you hate them? Tell me why or why not a person should learn about their life.

Paragraph Six: Conclusion

This needs to be in 12 Font, double spaced, Times New Roman, Book Antiqua or New York font with one inch Margins.

The written report needs to be 2 or 3 full pages of text. A page and a half will not be enough.

This project will be due on_____. Any later than this will be 30 points off per day.

A rough draft of the typed portion of the report will be collected on Monday _____.
